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Book Descriptions:

c96 broomhandle manual



This is one of a series of identification guides for the C96 produced by Mauser. To the best of our knowledge, all the examples shown are original pre1945 manufacture. Mauser supplied the C96 to Westley Richards in the UK for resale. Chinese Communist General Zhu De carried a Mauser C96 during his Nanchang Uprising and later conflicts; his gun with his name printed on it can be viewed in the Beijing war museum. Markings include a sixpointed star on both sides of the chamber and the crest of Sultan Abdul Hamid II a trophy of crossed Turkish flags, various polearms, and a collection of his royal awards and honours and the Muslim year 1314 on the square left rear frame panel. It is often confused with the Turkish contract Mauser. Original 9mm pistols can be told from 7.63mm to 9mm conversions because they have 9mm rated sights marked 50m 500m rather than 7.63mm rated sights marked 50m 800m. They have Wehrmacht proof marks and the Mauser serial numbers come from the early to mid 1930s. The weapon had ceased production in 1937 but the order was filled from remaining stocks. According to Kersten, Moll and Schmid, these were likely purchased by the High Command of the Armed Forces and issued to motorcycle and flak crews of the Luftwaffe. They were dropped from production after 1899 due to poor sales and little military interest. The name comes from the US Army designation of the Mauser pistol sent to participate in their selfloading pistol trials. The stock doubled as a case or holster and attached to a slot cut in the grip frame. It was designed to appeal to the arms markets in South America and China. Mauser C96 pistols in this caliber usually have an indentation milled into the upper surface of the magazines follower to facilitate feeding of the straightcased 9.25mm cartridge cases. The rifling in the barrel has a unique 138 twist. In addition, the flat surfaces extending around the chamber are longer to accommodate the higher pressures of the 9.25mm cartridge. <http://17bemay.com/sample/pics/details-style-manual-pdf.xml>

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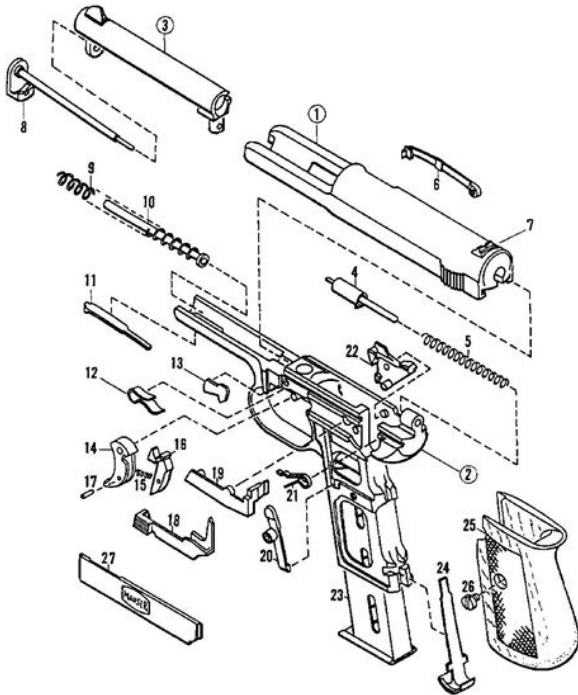
Examples of Mauser C96s in this caliber are rare, but are still occasionally found on the private collectors market. The 925mm Mauser export caliber receded from the market as the armaments industry reoriented itself towards military manufacture during World War I, but the round enjoyed a resurgence in popularity as a submachine gun caliber in the 1930s. It also possessed a 40round magazine and was chambered in 919mm Parabellum. The M1917 Mauser trench carbine was introduced during World War I and was intended as a cheaper replacement for the expensive Lange Pistole 08 in closequarters combat. The confiscated weapons were then used to arm government forces, leaving them with a hodgepodge of military and civilian arms. To meet the conditions of the Treaty of Versailles, a major reworking project was begun that set about converting these weapons. They also had to be converted to the standard 7.6325mm Mauser round, though a few hybrid Mausers were made with salvaged Luger barrels that were chambered for 7.6521mm Parabellum. Compliant confiscated government issue guns were marked M1920. This practice was continued on German service pistols even after the ban was ignored and the conversions had stopped. It was sold in quantity to armies in the contested Baltic region and was carried by the Poles, Lithuanians, German Freikorps and White Russians. The early model M30s had a 132 millimetres 5.2 in barrel, but later models had the traditional 140 millimetres 5.5 in barrel. It was made from 1930 until 1937. From 1932 to 1935, the Yugoslavian military tested batches of the Schnellfeuer in both 7.63mm and 9mm Parabellum for the purpose of arming mountain troops and special operations units. After World War II, importers sold a semiautomatic conversion of the detachable magazine Schnellfeuer that was made for the US surplus market. <http://dbmotorbrokers.com/userfiles/detech-eds-manual.xml>

PASAM MOD1, of which 101 were modified, received a metal frame extension welded to the magazine housing. A metal frame attached to the receiver supported a rectangular wooden foregrip, taking pressure off the barrel. In both models, of course, the barrel was left free so as to enable it to do its short recoil during firing. It is based on the C96 which was widely used in China since the 1900s and is chambered for the Type 51 cartridge Chinese copies of the Soviet 7.62x25mm Tokarev cartridge, but it is fed by a 20round detachable box magazine instead of the 10round nondetachable magazine in a standard C96. A 10round box magazine is also available for the firearm. The Type 80 is said to have an effective firing range of 100 metres about 109 yards and a muzzle velocity of 470 meters per second about 1542 fps. The Type 54 was the standard service pistol of the PLA from the 1950s to the 1990s, especially the Type 54s in service in the Chinese special forces, as a small, light weapon which was required to be good at both attacking and personal defending, similar to that of a PDW. Mechanically, it was laid out approximately like the Mauser original, but without the removable lock frame. Internal parts trigger, hammer, safety lever, etc. pivoted on pins and screws extending through the frame. The screws also held the frame together. The bolt was of round crosssection, unlike the square Mauser bolt. The MM31 was manufactured until 1934. A total of about 10,000 were made, in perhaps four successive variants. 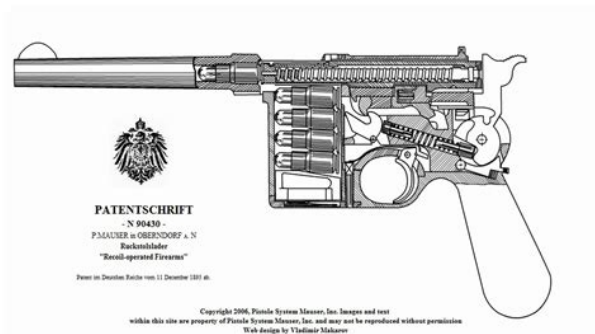

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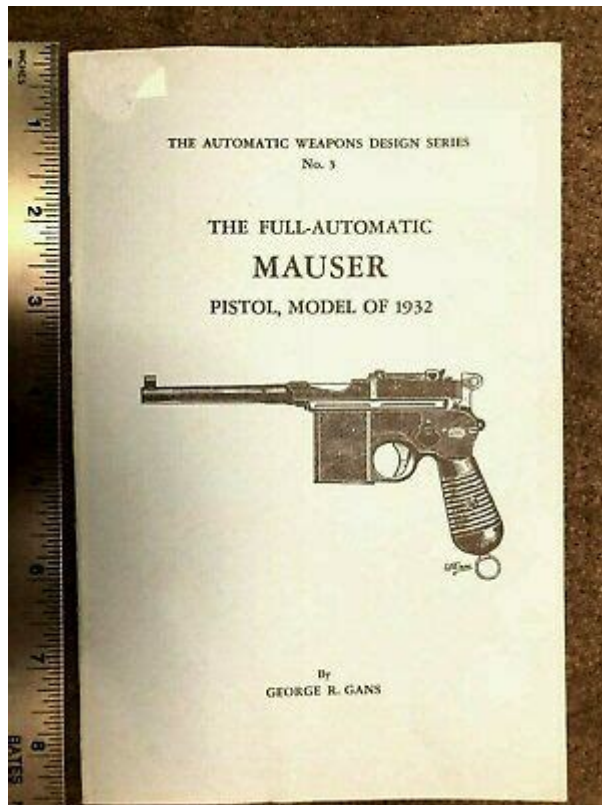

Jonathan Ferguson begins the story of this weapon with the impetus for its design during the early days of selfloading pistols with the Borchardt pistol preceding it and the Bergmann and Luger adding later competition. Really, there were a number of designs attracting attention of militaries from all over Europe and the US. The Mauser just never caught on with militaries, partly because of the inherent conservatism of militaries and the officer classes. One can read between the lines of some of the military officers disparaging the Mauser, though there were men who used them and swore by them such as Churchill. The author covers the militaries, outlaws and revolutionaries who did adopt the weapon, usually at the edges relevance such as the various factions in China which was a big buyer of both authentic Mausers and unauthorized clones and outright fakes. The author covers the Spanish companies that made illegal copies of the Mauser and a couple that introduced selectfire versions, prodding Mauser to do the same thing with the Schnellfeuer 712. The author ends the story with the influence this fine pistol had on pistols far beyond its own time. This Osprey book has all the excellent color plates, vintage black and white pics Osprey is known for as well as wonderful fullcolor pics of the wonderful products of the gunmakers art, the fine machining and polishing, the rustblueing, the quality wood grips and stocks. The only screw in the weapon is the one securing the grip panels. The pistols components all fit together and remain in place like an elaborate 3D puzzle. The weapon is accurate and mechanically reliable, but expensive and somewhat awkward to shoot. It was quickly outclassed by Browning designs manufactured by Colt in the United States and FN in Belgium. Nevertheless, it remained popular around the world, and production continued in Germany until 1937. It was more robust than the Luger P08, and was still commonly found in the holsters of German soldiers during and after WWII. The demand was so great, in fact, that even foreign imitations such as the Spanish Astra Model 900 series were actively procured, and various local arsenals would go on to massproduce the Germanpattern design. One such indigenous efforts was made by a weapons lab within the countrys Shanxi Province, albeit in a modified form. The imported pistols, as well as the majority of Chinesemade copies, fired the German designed highvelocity 7.63x25mm cartridge, but the Warlord of the Shanxi Province, Yen Hsishan, had the design expanded to chamber the harderhitting Americandesignated.45ACP to simplify his supply needs, as his men also used the Thompson submachine gun. Many modified their Mausers with the 712 schnellfeuer conversion kit to make them fully automatic. The modified pistols suffered from excessive muzzle climb due to recoil when fired on full automatic, making accurate bursts difficult.

The C96 also had ejection problems due to design flaws in the extractor and ejector. Despite being significantly more powerful, .45ACP develops less operating pressure in the chamber than the 7.63x25mm and 9mm rounds the pistol was designed for. Spent cases were ejected from the breech with minimal force as the bolt cycled. Since the C96 design ejects upwards from an ejection port in the top of the weapon, spent casings would not be ejected hard enough to clear the port, causing the pistol to jam due to gravity, of all things. This technique was feared by the Japanese. It was initially developed as a semiautomatic, but further enhancements allowed for it to have fully automatic functions similar to the M712 Schnellfeuer variant of the C96, and eventually extra ammunition

The research done also thanks to Jon Speed shows that, on the basis of the existing documentation, there were no direct sales by Mauser to the German Armed Forces or to the WaffenSS. Mausers sales documents track for example the sale of 10,000 units to China in 1938. Total production is estimated at around 100,000 units including the limited production of the Nicklmodel from 1930.

Mausers internal documents show that the sale of these automatic pistols ended in 1939 and there are no Schnellfeuer pistols on Mausers inventory lists after that date. This information must be correctly interpreted, in fact it is not unusual that weapons not officially in service were sold to units not directly by Mauser but through other dealers. This was a usual practice and it can lead to confusion when mistakenly talking about Mauser contracts with different users when they were supplied by dealers. Mauro Baudino. Original development of the self loading pistol started in 1894, it yielded the C96 Construction 1896. At the time, the 7.63mm cartridge was the most powerful handgun cartridge and was not surpassed until the 1950's with the development of the .357 Magnum. The pistol was in production for about 40 years and was adopted by a number of countries militaries, however, never in a grand numbers as other hand guns were. Most likely this was because of the expense of manufacture and its awkwardness of handling. The Broomhandle was, however, quite popular with the civilian market and was purchased as private weapons to be carried by officers in a number of countries. Even Winston Churchill carried a C96 while in the service. The 9mm Luger Parabellum weapons will have a red "9" engraved into the pistol grip to distinguish them from 7.63mm models.

After WW1, because of treaty limitations, Mauser was completely forbidden to build firearms. However, as time went on, enforcement became lax and Mauser went back to building firearms, notably a shorter barreled C96. The shorter barrels 3.5 to 3.9 inch length were a consequence of the original treaty which forbade barrels over approximately 4 inches 100mm. These shorter barreled pistols became known as "Bolos". These were not the first Bolos made nor do ALL Bolos have the shorter barrels originally, there were long barreled Bolos made before the war, but by far the short barreled Bolos are the most common. The Bolo nickname may have come about because Russian Bolsheviks purchased many of these weapons, but this cannot be proven. A full auto version with detachable magazine was also created and is named after the German word for rapid fire, Schnellfeuer, the model of 1932. There have been instances of fakes. There are pistols that are parts guns that do not command the highest of prices. This is truly a "buyer beware" pistol. Do your homework and ask lots of questions. Additionally, many pistols have either been rebarreled or barrel lined from the original condition. There are a number of sources of information that can be accessed. Print books include Obviously, these pistols are old. True original mint condition pistols are rare and one would never even think of firing them. It would be wise to have it looked over by a competent gunsmith. Do not use it in your C96. Instead, there are companies FNM Portuguese that make correct loads for the 7.63 Mauser at a reasonable price. Reloading is another option, and the correct dies, brass and bullets are available through numerous sources.
